



Two-Tone Mitts

Finished Measurements

7" around, 10" from cuff to top

Yarn

Knit Picks Swish Worsted (100% Superwash Merino Wool, 50g/110yd) Shown in MC Honey, C1 Black or MC Rouge, C1 Amethyst Heather; 1 skein each

Needles

US 5 dpns

Notions

Stitch Markers
Stitch holders or scrap yarn
Scissors
Yarn needle

Gauge

23 sts and 32 rows=4" in st st, unblocked

These minimalist, unisex mitts are perfect last-minute gifts for everyone on your list. Worked from the cuff up with minimal shaping, they virtually fly off your needles. Change the colors to match team colors, school colors, or just favorite colors! Everyone on your Christmas list will love a pair of Two-Tone Mitts!

Directions

With MC, CO 40 sts. Divide evenly among 4 needles and work in the rnd as follows:

(K1, P1) for 2 rnds.

K 39 rnds.

Break yarn, join C1.

K 2 rnds.

K19, PM, inc 1, K 2, inc 1, PM, K to end.

K 2 rnds, slipping markers as you go.

K to marker, SM, inc 1, K to marker, inc 1, SM, K to end.

Repeat the last 3 rnds until you have 16 sts between the markers.

K 1 round.

K19, remove marker, transfer 16 sts to stitch holder or scrap yarn, remove marker, CO 2 with backwards loop CO, K to end. (40 sts)

K 15 rnds.

(K1, P1) for 2 rnds.

BO in pattern.



Thumb

Transfer 16 thumb sts from st holder or scrap yarn to needles.

PU and K 2 sts from CO at edge of thumb opening. K around, arranging sts evenly across needles. (18 sts)

K 2 rnds.

(K1, P1) for 2 rnds.

BO in pattern.

Finishing

Weave in ends. Block lightly.
